

Four Stages of Writing – ARISE Youth Projects

Stage 1: The Muse/Madman

You will begin to compose an essay today in four stages. There will be other classes over the next six weeks.

The theme is: What did we do for our ARISE youth project?

On the papers provided list as many words and phrases as come to mind. The sky's the limit. Keep adding to the list. Any new idea that crops up when you write one, just add it on.

- If you get stuck with one direction, try another. Fill the paper. Don't stop to correct anything. Just keep going. If you can't think of anything, write "I don't know" until another idea pops up.
- What are some props, visuals, sounds, music and video clips you could use to stimulate ideas?
- What are the things that block you from writing? Do the opposite.

We will be taping your papers up front and doing more work with your ideas.

Four Stages of Writing – Muse/Madman, Architect, Carpenter and Judge

1 Stage 1: The Muse/Madman

- Brainstorming
- Brain-dumping
- Unfettered writing/recording
- Research
- Random online searches
- Looking for triggers to some mother-lode of ideas/words within you

2 Stage 2: The Architect

- Organizing
- Structuring
- Sketching/building a framework
- The three to five boxes that are your key parts/pieces: Beginning, Middle, End

3 Stage 3: The Carpenter

- Hammering the sentence boards on the frame
- Stringing the words into sentences
- Filling in all the spaces in the structure

4 Stage 2: The Judge

- Editing
- revising
- Rewriting
- Checking grammar, spelling, usage, etc.
